Fabric fairly fine pink (7.5YR 8/4), with few lime inclusions.

The internal surface has traces of red (10R 5/8) to light red (10R 6/8) paint and the external traces of a thin dusky red (2.5YR 4/4) glaze; visible brush marks.

Anthropomorphic (female) figurine. Completely preserved. White marble; Mylonas (*Eleusis* 138) reports Pentelic marble.

H. 24.3; W. 6.7 (shoulders) or 6.4 (hips). Long cylindrical (diam. 2.65-30.5) neck-cum-head ("long columnar" in Phelps 1987, 235).

The head, undifferentiated from the neck, is shaped in abstract fashion with only nose and eyes clearly indicated. The eyes are carefully shaped as lentoid depressions, which might have accommodated inlays of a different material (in general, such composites are extremely rare in Neolithic figurines). Ears or other facial features are not preserved. Two short grooves are observed on the side of the head at eye level, for which there are not parallels, although Mylonas (*Eleusis* 138) suggested that they may have been representations of eyebrows. It is possible that, like the eye-depressions themselves, these grooves originally may have accommodated inlays of a different material. Possible traces of oxide black paint at the back of the head might have been intended to represent hairstyle. Unlike the undifferentiated body-neck part, other body parts (thighs, tibiae, hands, abdomen) are marked by deep and bold incised grooves (0.05-0.04 wide), whose edges have been occasionally carefully smoothed. The arms are folded right below the breasts, which are barely discernible. The fingers are indicated by shallow and crudely executed incisions. Steatopygic rendering of the lower body. The position of the legs possibly intended to indicate seated position. The genitalia are not explicitly marked.

Provenience: Unknown. Tsountas reports that this a find from a tomb at Mandra (Zervos 1962-1963, see *infra*). Buchholz and Karageorghis (1973, 98) record as provenience "Attika, site unknown".

Cycladic folded-arm figurine. Almost completely preserved (except for small parts in the lower body and right arm). Marble; Mylonas suggests island marble (*Eleusis* 140).

H. 0.24.5, max. w. 11.1, thickness 3.3.

The ovoid/triangular head is well-differentiated from the well-shaped neck (ovoid diam. 2.6-3.1). Except from the sculpted left eye and nose (both highly worn), no other facial features are discernible. The folded arms (right arm folded above the left) are barely discernible as well. Possible indication of breasts below shoulder level. The lower body and the legs are disproportionately short (about one fourth of the total height), without any differentiation or indication of body parts.

Surface very worn and plausibly oxidized (affected by soil matrix?).

Provenience: Unknown (burial offering?).

References: *Eleusis* 140-141, fig. 116; Thimme 1977, no. 13.

Parallels: Tsountas (1898, 138) states that the Eleusis figurine comes from a plundered grave at Aigialē on Amorgos (and cites Blinkenberg, *Antiquités Pré-myécéniennes*, Mémoires des Antiquaires du Nord 1896, p. 63). Its short legs (if the figurine, as it seems almost certain, is complete) might be paralleled to figurine ET9 in the National Bank of Greece Collection (Doumas 2000, 186, no. 313).

APPENDIX I: THE INSCRIBED STIRRUP JAR (EL Z 1)¹⁶⁵⁸

The inscribed stirrup jar from Eleusis,¹⁶⁵⁹ currently classified as EL Z 1¹⁶⁶⁰, is perhaps the single most discussed Bronze Age find from the site.¹⁶⁶¹ The vessel, almost intact, originates from a deep sounding under the Lesser Propylaea, where a floor associated with LH decorated pottery and a wall fragment were found (E SU 12, locus 1, see figs 148 and 149).

EL Z 1 (fig. 150), the only Linear B inscription so far known from Attica, belongs to a well-studied pottery and epigraphic group that has now been established as a particularly LM IIIA2-IIIIB phenomenon. Transport coarseware stirrup jars (FS 164) are a particular

The current nomenclature of the Eleusis ISJ, as well as all Linear B inscriptions on pottery is established by Sacconi (1974, 12-3, 219-48), who uniformly applied the Z classificatory prefix and inventory numeration for all pottery inscriptions, including singletons (such as the ISJs from Eleusis or Orchomenos), which were not numerated by Raison (1968) except for their site prefix: plain EL and plain OR respectively (cf. Sacconi 1974, 45-6 for EL Z 1).

1661. The inscription was first announced by Kourouniotes (1931-1932 [1935], 23, fig. 26) and then published swiftly and independently by Mylonas

(1936a, 426-31; 1936b) and Evans (1935, 744, n. 1, suppl. pl. XIX). Although awareness of the Eleusis find must have come at an advanced stage of his work for the final semi-volume of the *Palace of Minos*, Evans apparently considered it worthy of a reference and even a supplementary plate. EL Z 1 had also been included in Pugliese-Carratelli's excellent pre-decipherment corpus of Aegean inscribed pottery (Pugliese-Carratelli 1945, cols. 607-10, fig. 252E, pl. XL *bottom left*). The significance of Eleusis as a post-Bronze Age cult centre may account for the occasionally sensational interpretations of EL Z 1 in pre-decipherment literature (Mylonas 1936a, 428; 1936b, 79-81; Forbes 1949; Hrozný 1949, 8-12; Jones 1951; Sittig 1951, 21). *Select* references in the post-decipherment era should include (in chronological order): Björck 1954, 124; Mylonas 1961, 49-51; 1962, 306-7; Palmer 1963, 275-6; Raison 1968, 123-5, fig. 156, pl. C; Sacconi 1974, 111-4, pl. development of the LBA III Aegean, out of an original Cretan ceramic invention.¹⁶⁶² We are fortunate enough to know their LBA Greek name: Nominative Plural *ka-ra-re-we* < **ka-ra-re-u*, plausibly **χλαρῆρες* < **χλαρεύς*.¹⁶⁶³ Within Linear B epigraphy, ISJs, by far the dominant group of Linear B inscriptions on pottery,¹⁶⁶⁴ are unique on two grounds. On the one hand, the production of these inscriptions (painted before firing, usually with the same slip that produced the typically minimal decoration on the jars themselves¹⁶⁶⁵) is inseparably linked with the production of these vessels; painted inscriptions, unlike the signs cut with the stylus on the surface of relatively moist to leather-hard clay tablets, could not be erased. On the other hand, ISJs are the only Linear B documents that are sufficiently demonstrated to have *moved* over considerable distances overseas. These “idiosyncrasies” of the material are the foundations of the agenda that defines their current study, predominantly revolving around the interpretation of their place within overseas trade patterns, administrative praxis and the politico-economic geography of the LBA III southern Aegean, as well as focusing on the implications of these inscriptions for Linear B palaeography and literacy in the context of their production and circulation.¹⁶⁶⁶

Chemical and petrographic analyses available for a very representative range of these vessels¹⁶⁶⁷ have firmly established that ISJs (as well as most TSJs) were produced on Crete during the LM IIIA2 and IIIB periods; while obviously destined as imports to Mainland centers in the northeast Peloponnese and Boeotia, no ISJ has so far been definitely assigned a Mainland provenance.¹⁶⁶⁸ The study of ISJs (both as a ceramic and as a distinctive epigraphic group) integrates Aegean prehistory, science, literacy studies, and Mycenaean studies.

The well-quoted Hesychian gloss *χλαρόν*: *ἐλαιηρός κώθων* had been crucial in our interpretation and understanding of *ka-ra-re-we*. The term defies a proper etymology and, given the Cretan origin of the shape, it is most plausibly the Hellenised form of a ‘Minoan’ loanword (cf. Anderson 1994-1995, 301-2, 310, 313, 317-8; for an attempt at an alternative understanding and etymological analysis see Gallavotti 1962).

1664. From a total of 207 currently known (published or announced in some form) Linear B inscriptions on vases (Sacconi 1974; 2012; cf. also reports of recent finds in Del Frio 2008; 2012), a mere eight inscriptions have been found on other types: MY Z 712,

TI Z 28, TI Z 52, KN Z 1715 and KH Z 25 are bowls, while KH Z 23 and KH Z 24 are cups (cf. Killen *apud* Haskell *et al.* 2011, 105; Hallager 2011, 417, pl. 274); DI Z 1 (ex IOL Z 1), a post-firing *incised* inscription on a kylix should better be considered separately. Single unidentifiable signs on TSJs (TH Z 859-862; 873; 875; 921; 967; 973; also MY Z 300) have been excluded from the ISJ corpus by Sacconi (considered in Raison 1968; cf. also Killen *apud* Haskell *et al.* 2011, 98).

1665. ISJs bear *painted* inscriptions with one exception so far: KH Z 16 bears a pre-firing *incised wa* atop its disc. Nonetheless, the point about the impossibility of erasure or correction and the permanence of the inscription holds well in this case as well.

This appendix aims at analyzing EL Z 1 under a similar cross-disciplinary perspective, taking into consideration the intrinsically dual nature of any epigraphic document. The palaeography, structure and content of the inscription will be discussed in detail, as well as the typology and chronology of the stirrup jar as an archaeological artifact. Naturally, this is not an essay about the ISJ phenomenon or the TSJ mobility in general, although general problems will be discussed where relevant.




Fig. 234. Drawing of the EL Z 1 inscription. Dark grey shade indicates central ruling line; stippling indicates worn or damaged surface in the environs of signs. Drawing by the author based on personal inspection (June 2012).

Text and Apparatus Criticus

The inscription (a revised facsimile drawing is shown here as fig. 234) is located on the shoulder of the stirrup-jar opposite the true spout (which is the only available area on this part of the vessel). It reads as follows (character spacing roughly approximates the relative position of the signs):

EL Z 1

- .1 *da-^{*}22-to*
- .2 *da-pu₂-ra-zo , wa ,*

Central ruling line slightly slants downwards in its right half. Signs written over the central “ruling” line: parts of their central “stalks” overlay them, clearly seen in the lower parts of ^{*}22 (.1) and *ra* (.2).

- .1 *-^{*}22-* and *-to* slightly tilted to the left.

.2 Surface in the upper part and around the first divider (between *-zo* and *wa*) worn. Small trace of paint to the right of the final “divider” following *wa* certainly accidental.

Comments on palaeography

It has been remarked that EL Z 1 (fig. 234) features a distinct closeness to what has been termed the “pinacological tradition” of the Linear B writing system, i.e. the sign forms and specific palaeographic traits that occur on this script as it appears on incised inscriptions on unfired clay tablets (and string-nodules). Emmett Bennett isolated EL Z 1 along with TI Z 30¹⁶⁶⁹ as those ISJs most influenced by the sign-forms and arrangements on tablets or nodules.¹⁶⁷⁰

In his astute consideration of EL Z 1, Bennett made a number of important observations suggesting the “pinacological familiarity” of its painter: These mostly refer to the drawing of the central ruling line *before* the execution of the sign sequences, the organization of the sign-sequences in two lines on the selected area on the shoulder of the vase, and the – presumably habitual – selection of sign forms that are familiar to us from the tablets.¹⁶⁷¹ In this section, we focus on the form and execution of the signs on EL Z 1. Further assessments on how these were organized and how this affects the affinities of this ISJ with “pinacology” will be presented in the next section that discusses the structure of the inscription.

EL Z 1 features seven different and clearly identifiable signs: AB¹⁶⁷² 01 <da> (twice), AB 05 <to>, AB 20 <zo>, AB 22 (untransliterated, *cf. infra*), AB 29 <pu₂>, AB 54 <wa> and AB 60 <ra>. Two “dividers” are also used, either side of *wa* at the end of line .2.

The specific sign-forms used are our primary data in any attempt to define more closely the palaeographic affinities of EL Z 1. Given the independently demonstrated Cretan provenance of the jar (see *infra*), we shall focus on *comparanda* from documents produced on the island. Any comparison between variants of the signs attested both on ISJs and on tablets

1669. TI Z 30, unfortunately a surface find from outside the citadel of Tiryns, bears a well-executed inscription on the disc on top of the stirrup with a single PN]qi-ne-u or]du-ne-u (Sacconi 1974, 100, pl. XVIII bottom; Melena 1982).

or nodules, however, should take into serious consideration the conditions that may affect their form in each document category: the differing graphic media (in our case, stylus versus brush), the physical characteristics of the writing surface (in our case, flat tablet surfaces or nodule facets versus convex TSJ shoulder or belly surfaces), and the different scales involved. The latter factor is particularly crucial: signs on ISJs are, due to the greater availability of writing surface, invariably larger than signs on tablets or nodules; omission of strokes and secondary elements in the form of the signs is quite normal and ubiquitous among Linear B tablet-scribes.¹⁶⁷³ These factors should be taken into cautious consideration, as they may obscure our *etic* assessment of the “distance” between different palaeographic traditions.

AB 01 <da>

This sign has a very simple form, consisting of only two strokes (a long vertical stalk joined by a shorter horizontal bar in middle height). Variation concerns chiefly the angle between the two strokes.¹⁶⁷⁴ In its both occurrences on EL Z 1 (initial sign on .1 and on .2) the short horizontal bar is almost perpendicular to the vertical stalk.

AB 05 <to>

This sign (T-shaped with an extra horizontal crossbar above the middle of the vertical stalk) also shows insignificant diversity.¹⁶⁷⁵ The variant on EL Z 1 (third sign on line .1) is quite canonical, with good parallels on other ISJs (TH Z 846; 849; 851-854; 863-865; 878; 882; 961; KH Z 7).




Fig. 235. Comparanda for AB 20 <zo>. Top row (left to right): **TH Z 840** (Light-on-Dark execution); **TH Z 849**; **TH Z 858**; **TI Z <23>** (scale c. 1:4). Middle row (left to right): **KN Ak(1) 610.2** (Hand 103); **Ak(1) 611.2** (Hand 103); **Ak(1) 612.B** (Hand 103); **Ak(1) 612.C** (Hand 103); **Lc(1) 536.B** (Hand 103); **Ap 639.1** (Hand 103); **V(3) 479.1** (Hand 115) (scale 1:1). Bottom row: Linear A example on **KH 57.2** (scale 1:1). Drawings by the author based on Chadwick et al. 1986; Godart and Olivier 1985; Raison 1968; Sacconi 1974; personal inspections.

AB <zo> (fig. 235)

This sign (fourth from the left on line .2) has the shape of a vertical upright arrow with a small crossbar in approximately the middle height of the vertical stalk. Occasionally a second crossbar may be added, as is the case with occasional examples by Knossian Hands 103 and 115 (fig. 235 *middle row*).¹⁶⁷⁶ The Eleusis variant bears a single crossbar placed a bit too high,

in a short distance below the triangular “arrow-head”.¹⁶⁷⁷ Its proportions may be paralleled to the fragmentary *zo* on **TI Z <23>** (fig. 235 *top row*; however, only the lower part of the sign is preserved¹⁶⁷⁸); the single-cross bar on other ISJ examples (fig. 235 *top row*) is usually placed a bit lower, right above, at or right below the middle-height of the vertical stalk.¹⁶⁷⁹




Fig. 236. Comparanda for AB 22 (untransliterated). Top row (left to right): KN Ce 59.2b (Hand 124-c); Xd 131 (Hand 124); As 40.5 (Hand 101); Dq(1) 439.A (Hand 121); Dq(3) 445.b (Hand 217?); Ga(3) 464.1 (Hand 223); Xe 544.b (Hand 103); Ak(2) 627.1 (Hand 108); F(2) 841.2 (unassigned); Uf(2) 839.b (Hand 122); doubtful reading on C(1) 989 (Hand 107) (scale 1:1). Middle row (left to right): KN V(5) 756.B; V(5) 1002.B (both by Hand 125) (scale 1:1). Bottom row (left to right): TH Z 871; TH Z 876; KH Z 39 (scale c. 1:4); Linear A examples on HT Wc 3014.b; *22^m on PH 31b.2 (scale 1:1). Drawings by the author based on Chadwick et al. 1986; Godart and Olivier 1985; Raison 1968; Sacconi 1974; Hallager 2011; personal inspections.

AB 22 (untransliterated) (fig. 236)

This sign, which is homomorph to the commodity sematogram¹⁶⁸⁰ AB 107 *CAP* “goat”, also occurs in Linear A.¹⁶⁸¹ The most usual Linear B variant consists of a central stalk (which

is executed with a single vertical stroke or as a two-stroke oblong leaf-like element), which is topped by an asymmetrical wavy element (drawn with either one or two strokes) (fig. 236 top row).

Although the precise Linear B value of AB 22 has not been settled yet, it has been persuasively argued that it is most likely in the environs of /*mbi/ or /b^(h)i/ > /bi/ or /p^hi/ (conventional transcriptions so far proposed by Janda and Melena are <mi₂> and <pi₂> respectively).¹⁶⁸² Although its homomorph commodity sematogram CAP is understandably ubiquitous, the syllabogram itself had long been considered as an exclusively Knossian feature, until it was found in the PN *ko-du-^{*}22-je* (seemingly in Dative Singular) on certain

Theban Odos Pelopidou tablets assigned to Hand 305.¹⁶⁸³ Although AB 22 is only moderately popular at Knossos,¹⁶⁸⁴ it is employed by at least fourteen identified scribes.¹⁶⁸⁵ Its extensive (but not intensive) use is considerably affected by its use to render the frequently-attested TN *da-^{*}22-to* (as is the case with EL Z 1.1 as well) or its derivative ethnic adjective (*da-^{*}22-ti-jo*) (cf. *infra*). Besides this TN, ^{*}22 seems to be attested predominantly in PNs (mostly without proper IE etymologies) and not technical vocabulary items (a category with a higher proportion of Greek forms). This pattern agrees with Melena's proposal that this sign rendered a particularly "Minoan"¹⁶⁸⁶ consonantal value, potentially perceived with a certain degree of ambiguity by Greek-speakers.¹⁶⁸⁷

The ^{*}22 variant that appears on EL Z 1.1 bears an interesting feature relatively scarce on the tablets: a "pendant ring" on the left half of the wavy horizontal "topping" element.¹⁶⁸⁸ This feature does not occur in other occurrences of this sign on ISJs,¹⁶⁸⁹ although it might be interpreted as a development of the second line to the left of the "topping" seen on the Linear A variants (fig. 236 *bottom row*). However, traces of a somewhat similar feature can be identified in the variant used by Knossian Hand 125 on KN V(5) 1002.B¹⁶⁹⁰ (fig. 236 *middle row*).

Other examples of AB 22 on ISJs (TH Z 871; TH Z 876 or KH Z 39) seem strongly reminiscent of the Linear A forms (fig. 236 *bottom row*). If we interpret the “pendant ring” on the Eleusis variant and the one on KN V(5)1002.B as a development of the characteristic second line of Linear A variants as well, then it may be possible to argue for a particularly conservative palaeography of this sign on ISJs.




Fig. 237. Comparanda for AB 29 <pu₂>. Top row (left to right): KN Sc 243 (Hand 124-F); Fh 343 (Hand 141); V(3) 479.1 (Hand 115); G 820.2 (unassigned) (scale 1:1). Middle row (left to right): KN Lc 646.C (Hand 103); Lc(1) 541.B (Hand 103); Gg(1) 702.2 (Hand 103) (scale 1:1). Bottom row (left to right): Linear A examples on HT 8b.1; HT 14.3; PK Za 15 (scale 1:1). Drawings by the author based on Chadwick et al. 1986; Godart and Olivier 1985; personal inspections.

AB 29 <pu₂> (fig. 237)

pu₂ (almost consistently /p^hu/¹⁶⁹¹) is not a frequent sign at Knossos,¹⁶⁹² but is employed by at least ten different identified Hands.¹⁶⁹³ Bennett has justifiably commented that the variant of this sign on EL Z 1.2 (second sign from left), which is also the only occurrence of pu₂ on ISJs, is over-embellished.¹⁶⁹⁴ Bennett’s comment apparently refers to the existence of *four* crossbars (or “twigs”) on each of the three “branches” of “tree-shaped” the Eleusis variant, while the sign variants on tablets do not normally exceed three such crossbars (fig. 237 *top row*)¹⁶⁹⁵. Comparison between signs by the same “scribe” executed in slightly different scales on tablets suggest that this particular “embellishment” relates to scale: on documents by Hand 103, a larger version of pu₂ features three crossbars (KN Lc 646.C), while only slightly smaller versions feature only two (KN Lc(1) 541.C; Gg(1) 702.2) (fig. 237 *middle row*). The extra crossbar on the Eleusis variant seems to be an effect of the larger *scale* in which the sign was executed. The difference between the Eleusis ISJ variant and the variants on tablets seems to be one of degree; therefore, it is not advisable to use its arguable “embellishment” as an indication of any meaningful distance between the two tradition in which the Eleusis variant of AB 29 belonged and the so-called “pinacological tradition”. On the contrary, the Eleusis pu₂ is perfectly placed within the variation range observed on the tablets. We should also add that the Eleusis variant lacks a “foot”, a feature also paralleled on the tablets.¹⁶⁹⁶

AB 54 <wa>

This sign does not feature significant diversity. The Eleusis variant bears a feature that Driessen¹⁶⁹⁷ considers more popular on Mainland examples: the verticals rise high above the top horizontal stroke, reaching (and slightly crossing) the centre ruling line. This feature, however, seems to emerge from the distinct care shown by the EL Z 1 painter in drawing the vertical lines of the signs “in the plane of the axis of the pot [...] the verticals of *wa* are vertical, while the horizontals come at the proper 90 degree angle [with them], strangely contrasting with the angle of the top rule at that point”¹⁶⁹⁸. It is conceivable that the extension of the verticals may have been an attempt to remedy the odd visual effect generated by the acute angle formed by the downward slanting of the ruling line and the

top horizontal stroke of *wa*. The rise of the verticals may have intended to give the impression that the ruling line is in fact the top horizontal stroke of the sign and, effectively, accommodate better the sign within the design of the inscription.




Fig. 238. Comparanda for AB 60 <ra>. Top row (left to right): MY Z 202; MY Z 712; MY Z 715; TH Z 847 (scale c. 1:4); Second row: KN Xd 203 (Hand 124-s) (scale 1:1). Third row: KN Xd 205 (Hand 124-r) (scale 1:1). Fourth row (left to right): KN X 722.b (unassigned); X 737 (unassigned); B(5) 799.6 (Hand 104); Lc(2) 446 (Hand 113?); TH Wu 44.β (unassigned); IK X 1 recto .1 (unassigned) (scale 1:1). Fifth row (left to right): KN Se 879.b (Hand 127); Do 924.B (Hand 106); DI(1) 928.A (Hand 118); Dk(1) 936 (Hand 120); Uf(2) 990 (Hand 122); V(5) 1002.A (Hand 125); Pp 495 (Hand 119) (scale 1:1). Bottom row (left to right): Linear A examples on HT 80.1; KN 1b.1; PH 7b.2; MA 2a.1; ZA 7a.1 (scale 1:1). Drawings by the author based on Chadwick et al. 1986; Godart and Olivier 1985; Raison 1968; Sacconi 1974; Piteros et al. 1990; Shelmerdine 2012; based on personal inspections.

AB 60 <*ra*> (fig. 238)

This sign features a most interesting diversity among its occurrences on the tablets, as well as on ISJs. Its basic “L-shaped” element is ubiquitous, but the rendering of its additional cursive element varies considerably: even within the limited number of its attestations on ISJs, it may be formed by one or two strokes, forming a sharp angle (on TH Z 847), an S-shape (on TH Z 712), a circle (drawn with a single brushstroke on MY Z 202) or as a semi-circle or curve open downwards (on MY Z 715) (fig. 238 *top row*). The Linear A variants can be either dextrovert or sinistrovert (unlike the consistently dextrovert Linear B sign) with a C-shaped element attached to the open end of the base line (fig. 238 *bottom row*).¹⁶⁹⁹ This variform additional element is usually disjoined from the L-shaped element in most Linear B variants (fig. 238 *fifth row*), and the scarce occurrence of variants with this additional element adjoined to the base line have been interpreted as “archaizing” (*cf. infra*). Such “archaizing” variants occur occasionally at Knossos,¹⁷⁰⁰ as well as on two Mainland documents: on an inscribed string-nodule from the “hoard” recovered at the Liangas plot on the edge of the Theban citadel (TH Wu 44.β)¹⁷⁰¹ and the newly discovered tablet fragment from Iklaina (IK X 1 *recto* .1)¹⁷⁰² (fig. 238 *third and fourth rows*).

The variant that appears on EL Z 1.2 is closer to the Linear A form of the sign. Unlike other ISJ examples, the additional element is here joined to the baseline, but in an unusual way: the additional element is drawn as a “crook-shaped” line stemming from the middle of the baseline.¹⁷⁰³ The Eleusis variant is perfectly paralleled to the *ra* on KN Xd 203 by Hand 124-s from the “Room of the Chariot Tablets”¹⁷⁰⁴ (fig. 238 *second row*). The baseline itself is drawn as a slightly upward curve in order not to be confused with the horizontal band it touches.

Extreme caution is needed in assessing the significance of such “archaization”. A few contexts where these variants are found stimulate discussion because of their arguable

chronological priority.¹⁷⁰⁵ Palaima has observed that certain “archaizing” palaeographic traits do occur on documents produced within administratively peripheral contexts.¹⁷⁰⁶ If the form of *ra* on **TH Wu 44.β** can be interpreted along the lines proposed by Palaima, the possibility that the variant of the same sign **EL Z 1.2** might fit the same pattern offers invaluable sidelights on how Linear B developed through time. Nonetheless, we should be concerned with the *scarcity*, the inconsistent occurrence of these “archaization” (their highly sporadic occurrence and their co-existence with other signs of quite “canonical” form).

Comments on the structure of the inscription

EL Z 1 has so far yielded the only certain example of a “long” (i.e. more than one sign-group) inscription on a stirrup-jar that is placed on the “shoulder” of the vessel. Indeed, almost all other similarly “long” inscriptions (interestingly concentrated mostly in the so-called “House of Kadmos” Corridor Δ ISJ “hoard” excavated by Keramopoulos) are placed in the spacious “bellies” of these jars.¹⁷⁰⁷ The choice to place a long inscription on the “shoulder” might have been dictated by practical considerations: as van Alfen has commented, the reading of most “longer” belly inscriptions must have necessitated their isolation and the “reader” moving around the jars or rolling them around.¹⁷⁰⁸ Shoulder inscriptions may have been more user-friendly, as they were easily accessed even when, we are tempted to imagine, the jar was stored with other cargo in the hull of a ship during its overseas movement.¹⁷⁰⁹

While it is likely that the apparent preference for shoulder inscriptions (as opposed to inscriptions on the belly or the disc of the jar) had a certain practical advantage, we may occasionally note single PNs, which could have been easily accommodated on the shoulder, but were nonetheless inscribed on the belly of the jar: a patent example is *wi-na-jo* on the belly of **MI Z 4** (in fact, almost at the level of the maximum diameter, as opposed to *wi-na-jo* on the shoulders of **KN Z 1716** and **ARM Z 1**).¹⁷¹⁰

Although **EL Z 1** is sometimes considered together with other “longer” or “three-word” inscriptions,¹⁷¹¹ it should be classified in its own unique category.¹⁷¹² The so far unparalleled¹⁷¹³ two-line format of **EL Z 1** is the result of a conscious decision that presupposes a careful study of the available writing space.¹⁷¹⁴ A crucial point in this decision must have been the painter’s awareness of the fact that *wa-na-ka-te-ro* could be conveniently abbreviated as just *wa*. A full spelling of *wa-na-ka-te-ro* would have made such a choice impossible. We may confidently assume that, in the time interval between the drawing of the central ruling line and the execution of the first sign-group *at the latest*, the painter studied the available writing surface closely in order to estimate the arrangement and size of the signs.

Bennett is certainly right that the central ruling line was inscribed *before* the signs were executed. This is most clear in the lower parts of *22 (.1) and *ra* (.2) which overlay the rule. The central ruling line must have provided the painter with a certain guideline when calculating the division of the writing surface. The wavy and horizontal bands (actually parts of the jar’s minimal decoration) served as upper and bottom margins respectively. The different size of signs on .1 and .2 is dictated by the asymmetrical division of the shoulder area’s lentoid shape, where the upper register (line .1) was naturally smaller, almost half the height of the signs on the lower register (line .2).

explained (van Alfen 1996-1997, 257 interprets the location of *wi-na-jo* on **MI Z 4** as an “inscriptional afterthought”). To the examples of short sign-groups written on bellies we may add other examples, such as *i-ṛu* on the bellies of **TH Z 866-867** and *ṛu-i* on the belly of **Z 868** (Sacconi 1974, 144-5).

for the]to preserved on **KH Z 7** (of West Cretan provenance). The possibility is tempting but cannot be confirmed because of the small size of the Khania ISJ fragment. **KH Z 41** (not analysed yet) is also suggested as a possible similar format by Hallager (2011, 419, pl. 275), although the sign(s) are badly preserved and not readily identifiable. Another interesting case is **MY Z 713**, which may feature two registers, although without any ruling line (.a:]*mā-pu*[: .b:] *ka* [after Sacconi 1974, 73). Although *mā* on the upper register seems joined atop the *ka* sign on the lower register, it is quite unlikely that we have to do with a monogram (a vertical ligature of phonographic signs), as Raison (1968, 150) suggested.

1714. Bennett (1986, 143) observed that the painter “carefully drew the signs to fit the space between the rules, with strokes can touch the rules touching the rules (especially the two verticals of *wa*), and those which can’t touch not touching (especially the top [horizontal stroke] of *to*).” An exception to this “careful” rendering is the baseline of *ra* on line .2 which touches the lower margin (one of the horizontal bands of the TSJ); this is drawn as a slightly upward curve to be instantly recognizable as different from the horizontal band.

The use of the dividers to the left and right of *wa* also invites some comment. The presence of the divider between *da-pu₂-ra-zo* and *wa*¹⁷¹⁵ is of course, in accordance to the use of these marks elsewhere in Linear B and paralleled in the use of dividers in the “longer” inscriptions from the ISJs from the “House of Kadmos” at Thebes. However, EL Z 1 features, along with TH Z 839, a further, redundant final “divider”. “Dividers” (most commonly in the form of short vertical strokes on the lower half of a given line of text) are predominantly *sign-group* separators.¹⁷¹⁶ or, as Raison characterized them, “signes de interponction”.¹⁷¹⁷ Their use at the end of a line is therefore redundant, since, in Linear B, the change of line does indicate a separation in itself.¹⁷¹⁸ Even so, such pleonastic final “dividers” do occasionally occur on tablets,¹⁷¹⁹ where we might suggest that it had been the result of a habitual scribal *lapsus* which was left uncorrected – even though it would have been easy to erase a “divider” – as it hardly generated any confusion.¹⁷²⁰ Even if it might be tempting

to see in this feature a certain pinacological influence on EL Z 1 (and TH Z 839), we should pay attention to the scarcity of the feature on the tablets as well.

Although significant familiarity with the sign-forms suggests that the inscription was written, rather than drawn, a distinct pinacological influence is not an absolute *sine qua non* for the structure of EL Z 1. Awareness of tablet-writing praxis does remain indeed a strong possibility, but one wonders whether any painter could have possibly devised the central horizontal “ruling” line (separating lines .1 and .2) independently, as a most convenient way of organizing the text. The “final” divider may be a further indication of this “pinacological” influence, although, as mentioned above, it is not a canonical feature of tablet-writing either. A seemingly most compelling “pinacological” feature on EL Z 1 is the abbreviation of *wa-na-ka-te-ro* as *wa*, which plays a crucial role in the format of the inscription: without this abbreviation, it would have been impossible to fit the inscription on the available shoulder area and the belly would have been left as the only possible option (as in the cases of TH Z 839 and TI Z 29). Again, we may question whether this abbreviation was an exclusive feature of the pinacological tradition: *wa* also occurs on KH Z 43, which otherwise bears no distinct pinacological influence, as well as the quite non-canonical KH Z 16 (incised before firing on disc); *wa-na-ka-te-ro*, on the other hand, is fully spelled on TH Z 839 followed also by a final “divider”.

We should conclude with a few comments on the intended “reading order” of the inscription. We have three possibilities. (i) The presence of a centre ruling line crossing the entire horizontal length of the inscription (with the registers marked as .1 and .2) compels the reader to read the inscription as two separate lines, beginning with line .1 (in the universal dextroverse Linear B reading direction) and continuing to line .2. van Alfen has even suggested that placing *da-*22-to* on line .1 indicates “greater concern for monitoring and recording a region’s production”¹⁷²¹, which, however, should take into account that the size of the signs on line .1 are half the size of those on line .2. (ii) Alternatively, Palaima has suggested that the final divider on .2 might indicate that *wa* was written in anticipation of a further text, which might have been the *da-*22-to* on line .1.¹⁷²² According to this ingenious proposal, the “intended reading order” of EL Z 1 would be reversed: .2 *da-pu₂-ra-zo*, *wa*

would have to be read first, followed by .1 *da-*22-to*. (iii) A third possibility may be suggested by the formulaic structure of the longer inscriptions on certain of the Theban “House of Kadmos” jars. In these three-lexeme formulae¹⁷²³, PNs (in rubric Nominatives) are consistently followed by TN *wa-to* and, subsequently, a second PN in Genitive. Although in this format the PN Genitive is not interchangeable – against a commonly cited view – with *wa-na-ka-te-ro* (TH Z 839 which should be considered separately¹⁷²⁴), it is not impossible to speculate that the EL Z 1 painter intended *da-*22-to* as a “superscript” annotation to be inserted between *da-pu₂-ra-zo* and *wa*. In this way, the “reading order” would be .2 > .1 > .2. Of course, in all cases, the full-length ruling line on the Eleusis ISJ would not have its canonical entry-dividing function that we see on tablets, but would serve as a canon to facilitate the orderly execution of the inscription (see further comments *infra*).

Palaima’s proposal has the advantage of accommodating EL Z 1, as Duhoux also observed, well within the corpus of other “long” ISJ inscriptions that begin with PNs.¹⁷²⁵ However, using other epigraphic “formulae” to resolve the “reading order” on the *unique* EL Z 1 is not helpful: although, indeed, the overwhelming majority of ISJs either feature a single PN or a formula that begins with a PN (such as the “long” ISJ inscriptions from the “House of Kadmos” or KH Z 43), we also have at least one example of an ISJ featuring only a single TN (TI Z 27 with *56-ko-we).

It might be interesting to observe that each line of the Eleusis ISJ, if isolated, can be perfectly paralleled to *entire* inscriptions on quite different ISJ formulae:

On the basis of these similarities, if we accept them are meaningful, we may hypothesize that EL Z 1 represents a conscious decision *not to omit* crucial administrative information, which could have been omitted under other circumstances. These “other circumstances” may be reflected in the examples of TI Z 27 (which focuses on the TN and omits the PN information) or KH Z 43 (which omits the geographic information). This observation cannot inform us on the “reading order” but illustrates that what mattered most on EL Z 1 was the inclusion of information *emically* considered administratively necessary.

For the time being, all three aforementioned “reading orders” can be considered theoretically possible. However, accepting proposals (ii) or (iii) have important consequences for our painter’s familiarity with the “pinacological tradition”: any “scribe” drawing a full-

length ruling line and then expecting the prospective reader to begin with line .2 is, to say the least, quite unaccustomed with *formatting* of Linear B documents as we know it. Accepting that either the .1 > .2 or the .2 > .1 > .2 “reading orders” can be correct, however, the use of full-length ruling line would still seem unusual: if .1 is perceived as an independent entry or register (as this is what ruling separation *commonly* implies on Linear B tablets¹⁷²⁶), *da-**22-to fails to provide crucial information *per se*, unless taken together with the information provided on line .2. These observations make it increasingly difficult to accept the EL Z 1 painter used the ruling line *in exactly the same way* as Linear B tablet-writers did.¹⁷²⁷

There may be one reason why the EL Z 1 painter used the full-length ruling line and this reason is patently un-pinacological: to use it as a measuring-aid, in order to divide and arrange more effectively the available writing surface, once the decision to use the shoulder zone had been made (perhaps for practical reasons, *cf. supra*). A full-length ruling would have been aesthetically acceptable (we should remember that horizontal bands are the dominant minimal decoration of TSJs), as it would give an orderly impression while also, as modern ruled notebooks, facilitating the orderly arrangement of the graphemes. Yet, we should admit that the motive behind all this care is the concern about the appearance of the inscription, as well as an awareness of its permanence and the impossibility of any major correction.

What the text organization and sign-forms of EL Z 1 positively suggest is a considerable degree of *familiarity* with writing by a careful and confident painter. A perhaps “special” proximity between EL Z 1 and Linear B tablet inscriptions is to be identified predominantly in the area of scribal *proficiency*, the evident easiness with which the painter has coped with a difficult format and has managed to produce a very well-measured result with signs of exemplary and confident execution. This is already very important, even without the further assumption of any direct influence from the latter to the former.

However, it is not necessary to assume any major “pinacological influence” to account for the structure of the inscription or the sign-forms used. As detailed in the previous section, a couple of the variants used on EL Z 1 (such as the “archaizing” form of *ra* or, possibly, the Eleusis variant of *22) might have looked unusual to a contemporary tablet-writer, but

we can have no doubt that they would have been instantly recognizable. The same cannot be said for the use of the ruling line, which generates a format a tablet-writer might have avoided.

Comments on the content of the inscription

EL Z 1 contains three lexemes, which all recur (or may recur) on Knossian documents. *da*-*22-*to* (.1) cannot be anything but the Knossian TN of the same spelling, as shown by the occurrence of other Knossian TNs (*wa*-*to*, *56-*ko-we* and]*e-ra*) or derivative adjectives (*o-du-ru-wi-jo* and *si-ra-]rj-jo*) on ISJs.¹⁷²⁸ *da-pu₂-ra-zo* is certainly a PN in rubric Nominative, which might relate to Knossian PN *du-pu₂-ra-zo* (cf. *infra*). Lastly, single *wa* is a well-known abbreviation of the adjective *wa-na-ka-te-ro* derived from the title *wa-na-ka* *ῥάναξ* “king” (both fully spelled and abbreviated forms occur on tablets, ISJs and a nodule, cf. *infra*).

1. The TN *da*-*22-*to* (EL Z 1.1)

da-*22-*to*¹⁷²⁹ belongs to Jennifer McArthur’s TN group (*b*), a remarkable grouping of Knossian TNs that also includes the “anchor” TNs *ko-no-so* *Κνωσός*, *a-mi-ni-so* *Ἀμνισός*, *pa-i-to* *Φαιστός*, as well as *da-wo*, *e-ko-so*, *ku-ta-to*, *56-*ko-we*, *su-ki-ri-ta*, *e-ra*, *ma-sa*, *ri-jo-no*, *se-to-i-ja* and *tu-ni-ja*. It has been repeatedly noted that this “grouping” is not based on geographical proximity (*ko-no-so* – the central controlling site itself – and *pa-i-to* are in north-central and south-central Crete respectively), but rather indicates high-status TNs.¹⁷³⁰

The close contextual associations¹⁷³¹ of *da*-*22-*to* are with the following TNs:¹⁷³²

As revealed by the aforementioned attestations, *da*-*22-*to* belongs clearly with McArthur's group (b). This is most clearly exemplified on KN As 40, which demonstrates the close association of *da*-*22-*to* with *ko-no-so*, indicating the high status of the site. We should also consider that the association between *da*-*22-*to* and *56-*ko-we* on KN Dn 1093 is generally accepted as carrying special weight, since Dn records (by Hand 117) seem to record flock totals in pairs of neighboring sites¹⁷³³. Besides the evidence of Dn 1093, it is interesting that both *da*-*22-*to* and *56-*ko-we* are also among the TNs that occur on ISJs.

Besides the obscure *me-ra* on Uf(2) 839, there are two documents that seem to disturb the affinities of *da*-*22-*to* with group (b): KN Ce 59 and Dv 1239. However, these occurrences cannot undermine the coherency of these associations: On the one hand, the TNs on KN Ce 59 belong to McArthur's groups (a), (b) and (d) while, on the other hand, the Dv set – taken as a whole – features TNs from both groups (b) and (d), apparently reflecting the special administrative circumstances of its creation.

da-*22-*to* is also associated with four “Collectors”¹⁷³⁴: the very energetic *u-ta-jo* and *we-we-si-jo*, but also *ko-ma-we* and **o-te-re-u*. Unfortunately, with the exception of **o-te-re-u*,¹⁷³⁵ the others are associated with what appears to us as a disparate assortment of (Central Crete?) TNs.

Interestingly, *da*-*22-*to* is not the only group (b) TN that appears so far on ISJs. Other members of that group are *56-*ko-we* (on TI Z 27, potentially on TI Z <41> as well) and perhaps *je-ra* (on MY Z 202).¹⁷³⁶ Interestingly, these seem to be produced in West Crete (MY Z

202 has been analyzed; TI Z 27 and <41> have not been analyzed, but they bear Light-on-Dark decoration, a feature so far almost exclusively associated with West Crete.¹⁷³⁷

This seeming “inconsistency” should be accompanied by the observation that certain group (b) TNs do occur in occasional associations with West Cretan TNs as well. *da*-*22-*to* and *56-*ko-we* are such cases (although not *e-ra*). The pertinent documents that demonstrate this “Western connection” are KN Ce 59 (already mentioned above), KN C 902 and KN G 820. Associations are not abundant, but they are interestingly “compacted” on three documents involving a total of eleven TNs. These associations have led scholars to locate *da*-*22-*to* between Knossos and West Crete.¹⁷³⁸

To be sure, *da*-*22-*to* must have been a major site of regional importance, with signs of direct palatial involvement and control in its economic affairs: The TN features on sheep records, as well as Knossian textile “production target” (Lc(1) 7901 by Hand 103) and “delivery/storage”? documents (Ld(1) 5955 by Hand 116?) and fiscal records (Mc 1508.B; 4456.B by Hand 132).¹⁷³⁹

This evidence for a special relationship between group (b) TNs and Knossos seems to run counter with the indications that the production and mobility of ISJs (where such group (b) TNs occur) were not a closely monitored affair, certainly not by Knossos. This intriguing – yet certainly illuminating – “inconsistency” serves as a useful reminder that central control is seldom monolithic and absolute, but may in fact be made tangible in variable and selective ways. We need not (or, indeed, should not) assume any totalitarian, “asphyctic” Knossian control over McArthur’s group (b) TNs. The latter must have been able to engage in realms of economic activity even outside “palatial” supervision proper.

We should not light-heartedly assume that TNs occurring on ISJs directly reported the site where the jar was produced. We shall comment more on this below.

2. The PN *da*-*pu*₂-*ra*-*zo*

Strictly speaking, *da*-*pu*₂-*ra*-*zo* is a hapax graphomenon. Yet, since the remarkably similar PN *du*-*pu*₂-*ra*-*zo* occurs twice at Knossos, it seems worthwhile to examine the Knossian prosopographic evidence, with the – admittedly fragile – proviso that the two types may be spelling variants of the same PN. However, there is admittedly no compelling evidence

for a true prosopographic identification and the *da-/ du-* alteration is not easily explained.¹⁷⁴⁰ The etymology of the name is obscure, although attempts have been made to identify it as a name in *-ων*, perhaps $\Delta\alpha\text{-}\varphi\upsilon\lambda\acute{\alpha}\sigma\sigma\omega\nu$ ¹⁷⁴¹. Duhoux, in his overview of Mycenaean PNs in *-zo*, also suggested that this PN might be etymologically associated with **da-pu₂-ri-to* $\ast\Delta\alpha\beta\acute{\upsilon}\rho\iota\nu\theta\omicron\varsigma$ $\Lambda\alpha\beta\acute{\upsilon}\rho\iota\nu\theta\omicron\varsigma$ “labyrinth” (a possibility, however, that may preclude its interpretation as a variant of *du-pu₂-ra-zo*).¹⁷⁴²

Let us, however, accept the working hypothesis that *du-pu₂-ra-zo* is indeed a variant of *da-pu₂-ra-zo*. Textual references to *du-pu₂-ra-zo* are given in full:

The only safe geographical association of *du-pu₂-ra-zo* is with *pa-i-to*: on **KN Da 1173** *du-pu₂-ra-zo* seems to act as a “shepherd” or, better, as a “flock supervisor”¹⁷⁴³ there (whether *pa-i-to* is Phaistos, Ayia Triada or any other unidentified site in their vicinity is, for our present purpose, irrelevant). The occurrence of an individual *ke-to* designated as *ku-ru-me-ni-jo* on the *lat.inf.* is of particular interest. If *ku-ru-me-ni-jo* is understood as a patronymic,¹⁷⁴⁴ we may note that such adjectives are indicators of special status.¹⁷⁴⁵ We need not assume necessarily that this *ke-to* acted in a capacity comparable to that of the so-called “Collectors”: *ke-to* is probably not in the usual Genitive and its addition in the *lat.inf.* is somewhat uncanonical (*lat.inf.* or *sup.* is very rarely – indeed quite exceptionally – inscribed on Knossian sheep records generally¹⁷⁴⁶). However, it is most interesting for our purposes that an individual named *ke-to* (but not modified as *ku-ru-me-ni-jo*) appears in the same “shepherd” position in connection with the “Collector” *u-ta-jo*: on **KN Da 1134** and **1135** *ke-to* occurs with the TN *56-*ko-we* and on **Dc 7161** with the TN *ku-ta-to*. It might not be coincidental that these two TNs are those most strongly associated with *da-*22-to*. In this way, we may have a quite indirect (but nonetheless extant) association between *du-pu₂-ra-zo* and *da-*22-to*, although this evidence cannot stand on its own.

Turning our attention to the PNs that occur along with *du-pu₂-ra-zo* on **KN V(3) 479**, we may observe that many of them do belong to such “shepherds”. *qe-ro* (.1) occurs with

du-pu₂-ra-zo and *pu-ri* link the PNs on KN V(3) 479 with the “Collector” *u-ta-jo*, a particularly active economic agent, involved (along with *we-we-si-jo*) with most TNs and “shepherd” PNs. Except for *se-to-i-ja*, all the TNs associated with PNs on V(3) 479 are also associated with “Collector” *u-ta-jo*.¹⁷⁴⁷

du-pu₂-ra-zo, therefore, belongs to a group of “shepherds” associated with TNs that belong to McArthur’s group (b), the grouping *da-*22-to* belongs to as well. Although it would be possible to return to our initial assumption (the *da-pu₂-ra-zo* / *du-pu₂-ra-zo* identification) in order to strengthen it in this way, it would be just as rewarding to close with a note of caution: we may reasonably wonder whether the huge onomastic and toponomastic material provided by the Knossos D- sheep records has a distorting effect on the prosopographic and geographic analyses of contextual associations in the records from this site.

All this brings us to the thorniest problem of any prosopographic association between those PNs attested on ISJs and those attested on tablets. Given the Cretan provenance of all analyzed ISJs, we should sharply focus on PNs attested on Cretan (effectively Knossian) tablets.¹⁷⁴⁸ Although a number of homonymies do occur, we are puzzled on whether these should be interpreted as prosopographic identifications. Although uncertainties over the precise chronology of the Knossos tablets and certain of the ISJs do hamper any proper assessment of the evidence, our main problem remains ultimately methodological: if homonymies occurring within documents from a single site (and a single taphonomic event¹⁷⁴⁹) should always be carefully confirmed by contextual associations, extreme caution is necessary in the case of any attempt to correlate such disparate documents as ISJs and

tablets.¹⁷⁵⁰ Thus, *e-u-da-mo* occurs on TH Z 853 probably produced in West Crete, but the same PN at Knossos (KN B(5) 799.5 by Hand 104; KN V(1) 57 by Hand 124) bears no explicit association with the well-demarcated group of West Cretan TNs; the same is true of *ka-ta-ro* (if interpreted as a PN on West Cretan MY Z 202) and KN Xf 8101 (unassigned); *a-nu-to* (on West Cretan TH Z 863; 864; 865; 961¹⁷⁵¹ and on KN As(2) 1516.12 by Hand 101 and unassigned X 658 verso); *e-wa-ko-ro* (on West Cretan TH Z 850; 883; 884a and on KN V(5) 1005.B by Hand 125); *ma-di-ḡo[* (if not read as *ma-di-jō[* on West Cretan KH Z 3 and on KN B(5) 806.4 by Hand 104; Db 1460.B by Hand 117 with *da-wo* and DI(1) 930.B by Hand 117 with *si-ja-du-we*); and *ta-de-so* (if correctly restored on West Cretan TH Z 869; 870 and KH Z 5, and again on KN As(1) 604.2 by Hand 103; De 1409.B, Df 1285.B and V(3) 655.3 by Hand 117; unassigned X 7558). In the above cases, a connection is not prohibited: it is simply inconclusive. However, evidence looks a bit more positive though for *ka-ra-u-ko* (on Central Cretan MY Z 715 and *ka-]ra-u-ko* on unassigned KN DI 7075.B with *u-ta-no*) and, perhaps most significantly, for the famous *wi-na-jo*.

wi-na-jo occurs on KN Z 1716 (Central Cretan), ARM Z 1 (ambiguous analytical results) and MI Z 4 (not analyzed yet, but typologically identical to KN Z 1716¹⁷⁵²), but also on a number of Knossian documents (KN Da 1197.b by Hand 117; Db 1225, 1282 by Hand 117; Df 5198.B by Hand 117; Dv 1310.B by Hand 117; Fh 1059 (perhaps by Hand 141 but formally unassigned); K(1) 875.3 by Hand 102; X 5750; X 9909). If *wi-na-jo* can be interpreted as an individual associated with oil production and management, a point suggested by Fh 1059, we may place special significance to the fact that he is designated there as *e-ra-jo*, the ethnic derivative adjective from Central Cretan TN *e-ra*. This seems compatible with the provenance of KN Z 1716 at least.¹⁷⁵³ The case of *wi-na-jo* is, therefore, our best case for identification between PNs on tablets and on ISJs so far.¹⁷⁵⁴ Given the possible *wi-na-jo* “correspondence”, one might think that the totally negative assessments of the prosopographic correspondences between ISJs and tablets have been perhaps over-cautious.¹⁷⁵⁵

In this context, an association between *da-pu₂-ra-zo* and *du-pu₂-ra-zo* seems possible, but not yet certain. Reasons for maintaining the association is the close similarity of the PNs,

as well as the compatibility of their TN associations. The most crucial problem, the function and status of this individual, almost entirely eludes us.

PNs mentioned on ISJs have been generally interpreted as producers or, more plausibly, managers associated with the TSJ liquid content, i.e. farmers/land-owners, or of the jar itself, i.e. potters.¹⁷⁵⁶ The very fact that inscriptions were painted before the jars were fired, indicates that administratively crucial information was entered already at this stage. If a batch of jars was produced in correspondence to the production of the liquid it was intended to carry, it is most certain that attested PNs would indicate agents firmly connected to the production of the ISJ content. It remains to speculate whether such a probability can be projected on other ISJ PNs.

3. The abbreviation *wa*

That the single sign *wa* might be used as an abbreviation for *wa-na-ka-te-ro* has been demonstrated by a direct comparison between **KN Lc(1) 525.A** and **KN Le 654.4** (both by Hand 103), related to textile production by dependent workers at *se-to-i-ja*.¹⁷⁵⁷ A further Mainland example of the abbreviation *wa* for *wa-na-ka-te-ro* may also occur on the nodule **PY Wr 1480.α** (unassigned).¹⁷⁵⁸

Although we have evidence that *wa* might potentially render the Dative Singular *wa-na-ka-te* as well (**KN F(1) 51 verso .2**), the occurrence of the term *wa-na-ka-te-ro* on at least two other ISJs (**TH Z 839**; *wa-na-ka[-te-ro]* on **TI Z 29**) strongly suggests that the sign *wa* here stands for this derivative adjective. At the very least, that *wa* here is indeed an abbreviation is perfectly compatible with the decision to place the inscription on the shoulder of the jar: the abbreviation was chosen by the painter in order to avoid crowding and give the other two sign-sequences “their proper prominence” (Bennett 1986, 143).

wa-na-ka-te-ro *Φανάκτηρος, a certain derivative adjective of the title *wa-na-ka* Φάναξ “king”,¹⁷⁵⁹ may be understood as featuring the binary contrastive -τερος suffix (cf. Sanskrit -tara; cf. Latin *dex-ter*), at a stage before this developed into a comparative suffix.¹⁷⁶⁰ The

semantic implication of this segmentation is that *φανάκτερος modifies objects or persons with a special personal attachment to the Mycenaean ruler and, more specifically, to indicate that what is associated with the *wanax* is to be “contrasted” with what is not associated with him. This has been commonly interpreted as an apt reflection of the ruler’s special position in social and cosmological structures, his distinct semantic “otherness”.¹⁷⁶¹

The exact interpretation of the occurrence of *wa-na-ka-te-ro* in the context of a stirrup jar cannot be discussed in isolation from a broader analysis of other ISJs where the adjective occurs (fully spelled on TH Z 839 and TI Z 29; abbreviated as *wa* on KH Z 43 and perhaps on KH Z 16¹⁷⁶²), as well as other references to the *wanax* and his activities as reconstructed from the palatial administrative documents themselves. Another remarkable “inconsistency” arises when one considers that the production of these jars (indeed, pottery production as a whole) and the scale of their mobility (i.e. overseas trade, however directional) are areas of economic activity where the documentation of “palatial involvement” is most uncertain and problematic. The interpretation of this “inconsistency” may relate to the broader nature of the ruler’s involvement in the political economy (or *economies*) of Late Minoan III Crete: it is likely that the ruler, “other” from the rest of the society, had the potential to act both as the central figure atop the “palatial” administrative hierarchy, but could also get entangled within realms of economic activity that lay properly outside the confines of the “palatial” reach.¹⁷⁶³

The very fact that *wa-na-ka-te-ro* or *wa* had to be explicitly recorded implies that the personal and direct involvement of the ruler did not concern the entire in the TSJ (ISJ) business, but only a fraction of it (whose extent cannot presently be speculated). Nonetheless, the occurrence of this adjective, which is also the only non-onomastic/non-toponomastic term certainly attested on any ISJ, may give us invaluable insights into the fluidity and complexity of the Cretan political landscape during the LM IIIA2-IIIIB phases.

Provenance of the stirrup jar

Although EL Z 1 was first sampled and analyzed in the late seventies, during the extension of the attempts to re-analyze most of the ISJs available at that time initiated by Catling

and Jones,¹⁷⁶⁴ its Cretan provenance had been suggested beforehand, because of the concurrence of a TN (*da-*22-to*) and a PN (*da-pu₂-ra-zo* understood as a mere variant of *du-pu₂-ra-zo*) that were already known from Linear B documents from Knossos. The Mycenological reasoning that generated this assumption¹⁷⁶⁵ is perhaps most aptly summarized by Leonard Palmer who argues the Cretan provenance of ISJs as follows: “In view of the small number of inscribed vessels which chance has preserved to us [...] we can hardly attribute the preponderance of these names in so many sites to mere chance selection. Prudence suggests that the sample reflects conditions in the whole original stock, that is to say the great majority of such inscribed vessels bore Cretan place-names. Since, again, it is highly improbable that all the different places [i.e. sites where ISJs were found] were exporting mainly to Crete, the facts strongly favour the conclusion that the provenance of these vessels was Crete”.¹⁷⁶⁶

While a combination of chemical and petrographic analyses has invariably suggested the Cretan production for virtually all ISJs known to date, and while the dominance of West Cretan production of ISJs is particularly clear, the exact provenance of EL Z 1 within the island has so far been somehow baffling. In their seminal 1980 publication, Catling, Cherry, Jones and Killen commented thus on the provenance of the vase:

“On the one hand, its composition can be demonstrated to be *close to, but not identical with*, that of the Chania controls and jars; on the other, it has become clear *from recent philological work* that *da-*22-to* is not to be considered a member of the West Cretan *ku-do-ni-ja/a-pa-ta-wa* group of toponyms, but rather is associated with the *da-wo/ pa-i-to* group and probably lies to the west of Tylissos. These two facts may not be unrelated. 44 [i.e. EL Z 1] may therefore represent an example of a composition from some location *between* Knossos/Tylissos and Chania.”¹⁷⁶⁷

It is not hard to see that the specific attribution of the vase to the region “between Knossos/Tylissos and Chania” does not stem from an objective and independent assessment of the scientific data. Rather, this consideration is a by-effect of the heated criticism (by archaeologists and Mycenologists alike) on the early assignment of Theban ISJs to East Crete.¹⁷⁶⁸ The wish to reconcile the scientific results with those of textual analyses is particularly

apparent in the quoted attempt to locate the production area of EL Z 1 firmly on the Cretan map.

In the final publication of the recent analytical project, which continued the Fitch analyses of the late seventies, the area where the chemical trace of EL Z 1 was placed has been termed “Group X” and is defined as an area lying between “West Crete” and “Central Crete/Boeotia” “in compositional terms... a composite of several overlapping composite groups – those of the Rhethymnon area, East Crete, and the Argolid (or more generally the northeastern Peloponnese)”.¹⁷⁶⁹ The accompanying tabular breakdown comments that the samples from EL Z 1 “lie in the Rhethymnon-East Crete range”,¹⁷⁷⁰ a not particularly informative verdict. While EL Z 1 does not constitute an exception to the so far exclusively Cretan production of ISJs, it is presently not possible to determine the location of its production with any greater degree of accuracy.¹⁷⁷¹

This is, however, hardly an impasse. The provenance of the Eleusis ISJ has so far been attacked only through chemical analysis. Future petrographic sampling of EL Z 1 will definitely throw considerable light to the problem.¹⁷⁷²

The next obvious step would be to sample those ISJs that bear (or may bear) the TN *56-*ko-we*, generally considered closely associated to *da*-*22-*to* (see *supra*). This had already been noted in 1980,¹⁷⁷³ but the only ISJ that bore this TN then (TI Z 27) was not analyzed.¹⁷⁷⁴ Recently, another ISJ with *56-*ko-we* has come to light in Eleni Hatzaki’s excavations along the north section of the Little Palace. The piece is currently unpublished,¹⁷⁷⁵ but when chemically and petrographically analyzed it will provide an invaluable augmentation of our sample.

We should always keep firmly in mind that assigning provenance to an ISJ bearing a Knossian TN is not the same thing as locating the TN itself on the map: although the assumed correspondence seems to work well for West Cretan TN *wa-to* or the ethnic adjective *o-du-ru-wi-jo* (< West Cretan TN **o-du-ru*) found on ISJs produced in West Crete,¹⁷⁷⁶

we have the “anomaly” of the Central Cretan TN]*e-ra*¹⁷⁷⁷ found on West Cretan MY Z 202.

This is a so far unique “disagreement”, but it may be sufficient to dispel the illusion that the relationship between the production area of an ISJ and the geographic reference on its inscription needs to be simple and direct.¹⁷⁷⁸ Caution is naturally needed, as]*e-ra* is not certainly a complete sign-group.¹⁷⁷⁹ However, we should note that TI Z 27 bears Light-on-Dark decoration, a feature that has so far been associated, almost exclusively, with West Crete.¹⁷⁸⁰ If this is further confirmed by the future analysis of TI Z 27, we might have a second case of a group (b) TN on a West Cretan ISJ, also solidifying the case for]*e-ra* on MY Z 202 as well. If future analysis confirms that an ISJ with *56-*ko-we*, such as TI Z 27, was manufactured in West Crete, this could have repercussions for TN *da*-*22-*to* as well.

Comments on the typology of the stirrup-jar

The Eleusis ISJ (*Figure 45*) has not been readily classified in one of Raison’s or Haskell’s typological groupings. The maximum diameter/ height ratio of the jar (0.68) falls squarely within that given by Haskell for his “Group A” TSJs, where the majority of the ISJs also belong.¹⁷⁸¹ There seems to be an interesting similarity with Haskell’s Typegroup IVb, whose type-example is a TSJ from the House of the Wine Merchant at Mycenae.¹⁷⁸² This Mycenae TSJ was found in a LH IIIA2 context and is securely assigned (both petrographically and chemically) to West Crete.¹⁷⁸³ Since TSJs did not change markedly throughout the LM/LH IIIA2-III B Early range, this further supports Haskell’s assessment that “on typological grounds, [EL Z 1] belongs with LM III B West Crete”.¹⁷⁸⁴

Comments on context and chronology

EL Z 1 was found in a deep sounding opened in 1933 under the SE corner of the Lesser Propylaea. The excavation was supervised by Ioannis Threpsiades, under the general directorship of Konstantinos Kourouniotes. Mylonas, entrusted with the study of the prehistoric finds was given permission to study and effectively publish the ISJ, although, apparently, not other finds from the same sounding. The lack of illustration of the crucial sherd material associated with EL Z 1 is not explained, although it might have been due to the fact that the publication of all other finds of this specific sounding had been assigned elsewhere.¹⁷⁸⁵

Given the quality of the documentation, virtually nothing can be positively asserted about the function of the building in which EL Z 1 was found (E SU 12, locus 1). Unfortunately, the sherd material reported by Mylonas has still not been located in the storerooms of the Eleusis Museum and the excavation notebooks so far retrieved have not been informative either.¹⁷⁸⁶

In both his publications on the context of EL Z 1, Mylonas advocates a date at the very end of LH IIIB or even well within IIIC for the deposit in which the jar was found.¹⁷⁸⁷ The implications of Mylonas' date are obviously important, and the Greek scholar himself saw the Eleusis evidence as supporting a later date for the Kadmeion "ISJ hoard" as well.¹⁷⁸⁸ It is commonly asserted that, on the basis of Mylonas' date, EL Z 1 "would be among the latest known ISJs".¹⁷⁸⁹ Yet, moving beyond possible implications for the date of the Kadmeion "hoard",¹⁷⁹⁰ we should observe that the still non-located Eleusis material, whenever found and restudied, would only give a *terminus ante quem* for the production of EL Z 1. Neither should we interpret the good condition of the jar as indicating a short timespan

between its production and final deposition: at the state of our knowledge, this is no more and no less than a reflection of favorable taphonomic conditions.¹⁷⁹¹

As this chapter is written, there is good and reliable evidence that the ISJ phenomenon extended from LM IIIA2¹⁷⁹² to *at least* the end of LM IIIB Early. The problem of the presence of ISJs in later contexts (late IIIB or even IIIC Early) is a particularly thorny one, recently addressed by Joseph Maran, who suggested a continuation of the overseas TSJ trade throughout the 13th century until the early Postpalatial period.¹⁷⁹³ Although Maran did not specifically address the problem of *inscribed* jars, he noted an interesting number of TSJ in LH IIIC contexts at Tiryns that cannot be adequately explained away *in toto* as LH IIIB leftovers or re-depositions. It is interesting that these “late” contexts consistently feature not “a random sample through the range of transport containers” of the preceding palatial period, but “only a segment of the former broad variety”, with light-on-dark TSJs being conspicuously absent.¹⁷⁹⁴ It seems that, although certain overseas TSJ mobility between Crete and the Mainland was maintained in certain sites,¹⁷⁹⁵ the pattern of such activity must have differed significantly from the “lively traffic”¹⁷⁹⁶ of the (IIIA2-)IIIB network.

The issue of the continuous circulation or re-use of TSJs (including, potentially, ISJs as well) is a particularly complex problem that necessitates broad and extensive analyses. So far, we may have evidence that, after arrival from Crete, TSJs enjoyed a predominantly local afterlife.¹⁷⁹⁷ We cannot lose sight of the fact that the distribution map of ISJs (including TSJs) indicates the sites where these jars eventually *ended up*, the final taphonomic moments in a *potentially* long and well-travelled life-history. We may wonder about certain sites that have yielded ISJ singletons, such as Orchomenos, Kreusis, Mameloukos Cave and, of course, Eleusis. Most of them are under-explored (a point not quite applying to Eleusis), but they have yielded no further signs of Bronze Age literacy. Could these ISJs have ended up there as a result of a continuous circulation, after their arrival in an adjacent central site (the *intended* destination in the jar’s first extra-Cretan shipment)?

Having said this, we should note that there is nothing in the form of the vessel to suggest any date later than the earlier part of LM IIIB (see previous section). Under these circumstances, and assuming Mylonas' date is correct, we are led to suggest that EL Z 1 had been carefully maintained (even revered) for a considerable time period (for a hypothetical suggestion on the motive of such reverence see the next concluding section).

Concluding discussion: An out-of-place jar?

"We are dealing with human history, human decision making, that is to say, activity which can and does defy objective assessments."¹⁷⁹⁸

EL Z 1 is an exceptional find, found in a reportedly early to mid-12th century BC context under the Lesser Propylaea. Its inscription displays a considerable familiarity of the painter with Linear B writing (possibly, but not necessarily, with writing on tablets).

Its inscription mentions a well-attested TN from Linear B tablets from Knossos (*da-*22-to*), where it belongs to a grouping of TNs of special status, perhaps of direct interest to the centre (McArthur's group b). This concurs with a PN (*da-pu₂-ra-zo*) that may also occur there (Knossian PN *du-pu₂-ra-zo*, a possible – but not certain – variant), also in association with McArthur's group (b) TNs. This PN is accompanied by the abbreviation *wa* (for *wana-ka-te-ro* "pertaining to the *wanax*"), which indicates a personal and direct interest/involvement of the ruler to the economic activity reflected in the production and mobilization of this ISJ.

Data available for the provenance of the jar indicate a Cretan production, although the precise region within the island cannot be located. Although a central/west Cretan assignment (somewhere between Knossos and Khania) is generally accepted, it should be kept in mind that this assignment is somewhat biased because of the contextual associations of the TN *da-*22-to*. Besides the obvious need to analyze petrographically EL Z 1 (as well as ISJs bearing the TN **56-ko-we*, such as TI Z 27), we should be cautious that the location of the TN of the inscription may not coincide with the production area of the inscribed jar itself.

The Eleusis ISJ belongs to a well-defined class produced in Crete in LM IIIA2-IIIB Early and imported chiefly to Boeotian (Thebes, but also Orchomenos and Kreusis) and Argolid sites (Mycenae, Tiryns, Midea), as part of a remarkable nexus of overseas trade. The presence of such an ISJ seems to be out of place in LH IIIC or even LH IIIB Eleusis on two grounds: (i) Cretan imports are almost otherwise negligible and coarseware TSJs are remarkably scarce at LH III Eleusis;¹⁷⁹⁹ and (ii) EL Z 1 is also our sole indication of literacy

not only at Bronze Age Eleusis, but in Bronze Age Attica, otherwise illiterate during this period. It is ironic that the Eleusis ISJ, demonstrating such a considerably sophisticated approach towards the writing surface, is found in a context that would have never suggested the administrative framework in which both the presupposed literacy and the mobilization of the vessel are to be placed.¹⁸⁰⁰

It should be therefore permissible to wonder whether **EL Z 1**, dated stylistically to LM IIIA2-early LM IIIB, might have ended at Eleusis by accident, being originally destined for one of the Boeotian or Argolid centers where considerable amounts of transport stirrup jars have been found. One might postulate that the jar itself had been re-used before it arrived at Eleusis; or, just as possibly, that it was included in booty from a shipload that never made it to its intended destination.¹⁸⁰¹ But what could the intended destination of **EL Z 1** have been, if we assume it was not Eleusis? ISJs themselves provide an interesting clue.

We may ask whether it could be coincidental that the two other ISJs that bear group (b) TNs were both found in Argolid sites (**TI Z 27** with *56-ko-we; **MY Z 202** with]e-ra). Additionally, the PN *wi-na-jo*, associated with both *56-ko-we and e-ra at Knossos (**KN Db 1225** by Hand 117, with *56-ko-we; **KN Dv 1330.B** by Hand 117 and **Fh 1059** with e-ra) occurs on an ISJ that ended up at Midea (**MI Z 4**). If these indications reflect reality, we might hypothesize that the intended destination of **EL Z 1** was the northeastern Peloponnese.

Such a hypothesis might generate the possibility that the Eleusis ISJ was indeed seen as an intriguing *curiosum*, an inscribed vessel within an illiterate community.¹⁸⁰² As such,

Another issue that affects a potential literate “reception” of **EL Z 1** on its *intended* Mainland destination relates to the scarce Mainland occurrences of sign AB 22, employed for the spelling *da*-*22-*to* on line .1. Recounting an “absurd” (in his own words) incident of writing imitation by a local chief who used it to enhance his own status within the Nambikwara community, Lévi-Strauss observes that “the Nambikwara had learnt what it meant to write [...] but not at all [...] as the result of a laborious apprenticeship. The symbol had been borrowed, but the reality remained quite foreign to them. it would have the potential to embody the prestige connotations that imported inscribed artefacts could have enjoyed in such contexts. Such conditions would have favored the long-term preservation of the vessel in a very good condition and, therefore, help us explain the difference between the production date of the ISJ (as suggested, among other things, by the vessel's typological affinities and the painter's considerable familiarity with Linear B writing) and its deposition date as argued by Mylonas. The good condition in which the ISJ was found does not suggest a short timespan between its production (on Crete) and deposition (at Eleusis), but rather that the vase was treated with special reverence down to the LH IIIC date advocated by Mylonas.

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APPENDIX II: THE FAUNAL REMAINS FROM THE OLD EXCAVATIONS

by Haskel J. Greenfield¹⁸⁰³

This report briefly describes the analysis of the faunal remains collected during the 1890, 1935, and 1938 excavations of the Mycenaean levels under the Classical shrine at Eleusis. The remains were analyzed in May 1993 in the Zooarchaeology Laboratory of the Department of Anthropology, University of Manitoba at the request of Dr. Michael Cosmopoulos and are curated in the museum at Eleusis.

The remains are tabulated in Table I(A-C) according to period and taxonomic categorization. They were divided into two chronological phases, where possible - Middle Helladic (MH) and Late Helladic (LH). Some deposits were only identifiable as mixed MH-LH, however. Since the total quantity of non-human remains from either phase is very small (MH N=38; LH N=15) and thereby subject to the random vagaries of small sample sizes and the various undocumented taphonomic sources of attrition (e.g. collection strategies), the discussion will focus on the combined total of both phases, which allows us to take advantage of the additional material from the mixed MH and LH levels (N=62).

The faunal assemblage was collected by hand in the trench during excavation. It is not a representative sample of the original assemblage since no attempt was made at systematically collecting all of the bones. As a result, statistics of the frequencies of remains represent what was collected and not what was originally there – telling us more about the collection-behavior of the archaeologists than the disposal-behavior of the inhabitants of the site. All statistics have been calculated on the basis of NISP frequencies. The number of specimens and the type of collection strategy make it unlikely that any of the specimens come from the same individual. The bias in collection strategy is reflected in the relative frequencies of identifiable and unidentifiable remains. In most systematically collected samples, the number of unidentifiable remains far outweighs the identifiable fraction. At Eleusis, however, the frequency of identifiable and unidentifiable remains is almost even. The mammalian faunal remains that are unidentifiable to a taxon (N=41; 54%) is only slightly larger than the identifiable (N=34; 45%). The frequencies of unidentified (N=9; 24%) and identified (N=28; 76%) molluscan remains

are very unbalanced in favor of the latter. The high relative frequencies of identifiable fragments from both molluscs and mammals testify to the preference for the collection of identifiable remains in the field.

Even though most of the bone and shell remains were in fair condition, none of the remains were measured since the measurable points were invariably damaged. The largest number (N=104) of bone fragments were characterized by medium weathering – some cracks with little destruction of the bone surface. A smaller number (N=47) were weathered only slightly, with only hair-line cracks. Only a small number (N=17) of bones appear to have been exposed to the open-air for a long period of time, with substantial weathering cracks and major destruction of the bone surface. All of the heavily weathered bones were from the mixed MH/LH strata, indicating that they were exposed to the elements periodically after disposal and that attrition would be expected to have been greatest in this deposit. All of the molluscan remains showed only slight weathering.

The fauna consist of both vertebrate (N=155) and invertebrate remains (N=37). The vertebrate remains may be divided between mammalian (N=152) and reptilian (N=3) classes.

Most of the vertebrate fragments were human skeletal remains (N=76). Most of the human bones were found mixed in the same bag with the fauna from Room I of the Sacred House; it is probable that these were from an unrecognized inhumation. Four human bones were also found mixed with the fauna in the bags from the mixed MH/LH units. The human remains will not be included in the discussion of the other mammalian remains.

The ensuing discussion of the distribution of remains will focus upon the combined total for both the Middle and Late Helladic phases since the quantity from any single phase is too small (and hence subject to random statistical variation) and there is no indication that the variation between phases is significant.

The relative frequencies of mammalian remains are similar to those from other faunal collections from the Middle and Late Bronze Age of the southern Balkans. The majority of the mammalian fauna are domestic ovicaprines (N=14; 40% of mammals). Most were identifiable only as indeterminate Ovis/Capra (N=10), but both sheep (*Ovis aries*, N=3) and goats (*Capra hircus*, N=1) were specifically identified as well. All of the sheep remains came from mixed strata and include a horn core, proximal radius, and distal tibia (all subadult/adult). Both the radius and tibia had slight use-wear polish and the tibia seemed to be a handle for some kind of tool that was inserted. The radius also had a slice mark from butchering. The single goat bone came from MH Sacred House 9 and was a proximal radius of an adult. Most of the indeterminate Ovis/Capra remains were from mixed MH/LH strata. They include one acetabulum (male, subadult), one ilium (subadult, possible cut mark, slight-medium use-wear polish), one mandible (adult), one metatarsal shaft (subadult/adult, very slight use-wear, slight canine gnawing), and one scapula neck (subadult/adult). One fragment was from the MH group 1 unit 317 (mandible of a young adult) and one from the LH Sacred House 9 (tibia shaft of a subadult/adult).

Domestic cattle (*Bos taurus*) are the second-most common mammal (N=11; 32%). They are relatively small in size, with a size-range common to cattle from the Bronze Age of the Balkans. Two mandible fragments were from the LH Sacred House 9 (subadult and subadult/adult). A temporal bone was from the MH strata (adult). The rest were from mixed MH/LH strata (one distal humerus, ischium, and tarsal C+4, and 3 rib shafts - subadult/adult; one mandible - adult).

Domestic pig (*Sus scrofa*) is the third most-common species (N=6; 18%). One fragment of a lower canine (adult) came from the LH Sacred House S SU 35 (findgroup 236 vol. I p. 54). A proximal shaft of an ulna of a subadult/adult came from the LH Sacred House 9. Four bones came from MH/LH mixed strata (three mandibles and one proximal ulna - all were from subadults).

Domestic dog (*Canis familiaris*) remains are fourth most common taxon (N=2; 6%). All were from the mixed MH/LH strata. One fragment was a radius shaft of an adult (heavy weathering); the other was the fused distal end radius and ulna of a subadult/adult.

The least frequent identified mammalian taxon is a small equid (*Equus* sp.) that may be a donkey or ass. It came from the LH Sacred House 9 and was the first phalange of a juvenile.

Almost (N=5) all the large-mammal remains were from the MH/LH mixed strata, one of which had slight use-wear. Two of the fragments had heavy weathering. One fragment came from the MH group 1 unit 317. They were mostly long bones. The medium-mammal remains were mostly unidentifiable (N=1), long bone (N=3, one was burnt black and one black/white, one was a small chisel-shaped tool), an ilium (N=1) and a scapula (N=1) fragment. Thirteen unidentifiable mammal remains came from the MH (one was burnt black). Fifteen came from the ML/LH mixed strata and most (N=14) had heavy weathering.

Three fragments of tortoise carapace were found in the LH findgroups of Room I of the Sacred House, but the species was unidentifiable due to an absence of adequate comparative material available during analysis. One fragment was burnt white.

Four species of molluscs were identified. The most common is *Cerastodema glaucum* (N=11; 39%). Eight fragments were found in MH strata, while three were found in the LH Sacred House 9. The second-most common was *Murex trunculus* (N=8; 29%). It was found in MH/LH mixed strata (N=4), MH group 1 unit 317 (N=2), and LH Sacred House 9 (N=1). *Arca Noae* (N=6; 21%) is the third most-common species and was found in a variety of contexts (MH/LH mixed N=2; MH N=3; MH group 1, unit 317 N=1). *Murex brandaris* (N=3; 11%) was the least common of the species. It was found only in MH/LH mixed strata.

In conclusion, there is little that can be said about this collection. It was poorly collected in modern terms, but this was the standard at the time of the excavation and any detailed discussion of the meaning of the frequency distribution of species, age groups, body parts, and other phenomena would be misleading. This collection is worthwhile reporting simply for the opportunity to increase our knowledge concerning the distribution of extant remains from deposits at Eleusis.
